Instructions

Assumptions

This activity assumes that participants are involved in or may wish to be involved in a business, project, initiative, or enterprise.

Step 1: Instructions [5 min]

Introduce the questions for regenerative business and the three categories. Check for unfamiliar terms or items that require definition (such as circular economy).

Step 2: Unpack one person's project [15 min] In groups at tables

Format

Small group

and individual

Allow the groups time to read the questions. Ask one person in each group to volunteer to share their own project. Have each group identify relevant questions.

Step 3: Debrief [10 min]

Ask each group to share a little about their discussion.

For ease of presenting the questions to a large group, in addition to the handouts, consider an A0 poster of the regenerative business questions
